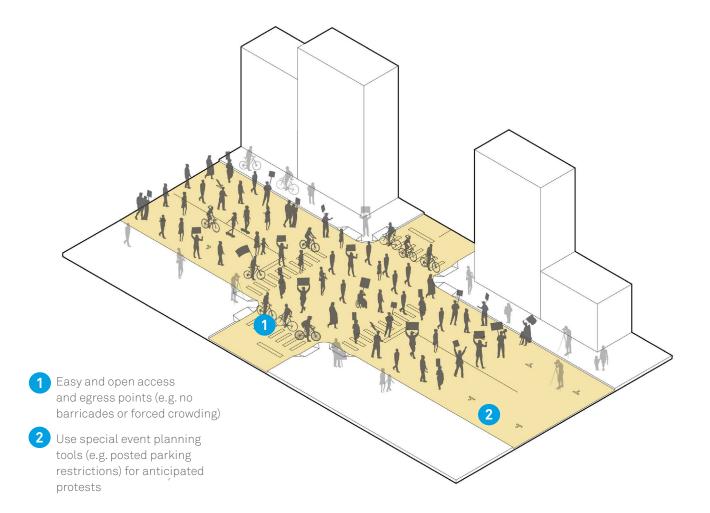
## **STREETS FOR PROTEST**



# Facilitate safe access to public spaces for demonstration and protest as a fundamental civic right.

#### CONTEXT

- Iconic parks, streets, and squares typically used for demonstrations or rallies.
- Decentralized in neighborhood public spaces and streets.
- Large streets and bridges; locations of community or historical significance.

**TIMELINE:** Hours to days.

**DURATION:** Days, weeks, months.

#### Minneapolis, MN, USA

Policy + Engagement	<ul> <li>Reaffirm the rightful role of public plazas and streets as places for protest and demonstration, even during the pandemic.</li> <li>Establish and convey clear goals for on-site management, de-escalating conflict, allowing unimpeded movement, and addressing medical/safety needs for all.</li> <li>Assure that permit/notice requirements do not criminalize spontaneous protest or people moving in the vehicular right-of-way for civic action.</li> <li>Ensure all on-site staff wear equipment consistent with public health guidance to prevent transmitting the virus, among themselves or to others in proximity.</li> </ul>
Design Approach	<ul> <li>Ensure safety of protestors, medical professionals, journalists, and Legal Observers with abundant space for physical distancing.</li> <li>Maintain free movement of participants along route and at intersections, pause points, etc., to prevent bottlenecks or forcing participants into confined spaces.</li> <li>Deploy heavy materials (or fixed vehicles) in real time along march routes to prevent motor vehicle violence and conflicts.</li> <li>Consider smaller, more maneuverable EMT vehicles or perhaps sanitation vehicles, which can also serve as receptacles for debris clean-up.</li> <li>Ensure that materials or vehicles are flexible to allow safe, easy egress in case of emergency. Leave gaps to prevent pinch points or corralling.</li> <li>If protests are noticed/ongoing: <ul> <li>Pedestrianize gathering space and remove unfixed barricades.</li> <li>Post route or station changes for transit, bike/scooter share, ride-hail, etc., to ensure options for essential workers and residents.</li> <li>Reconfigure temporary furnishings to maintain participant safety and access.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Management Practices	<ul> <li>Coordinate on-site logistics through social service providers such as social workers, EMTs, or firefighters.</li> <li>Refine detour plans and update app data for affected transit routes and stations, as with other major street closures.</li> <li>Avoid crowd management strategies that imply need for detention, such as no-go zones, curfews, and designated access/egress points.</li> <li>Adjust parking requirements, providing clear information to businesses and residents.</li> </ul>

Revise interagency agreements and employee guidelines periodically based on agency . values, common goals, and public health guidance.
